"Should we go in?" Violet whispers.


Of course they do.




Geography of Italy

Italy has a Mediterranean climate, which means hot summers and mild winters. Most of the rain falls in autumn and spring. Since Italy is a long country, the weather can change depending on where you are—it's cooler in the mountains and warmer by the sea.

Italy is one of the oldest countries in Europe, and its history goes back 200,000 years!





History of Italy

Italy has been home to many powerful and fascinating civilizations. Around 700 BCE, the Etruscans lived in central Italy, building cities and roads. Then came the Romans, who founded the Roman Republic, and later the Roman Empire in 27 BCE. Rome became one of the most important cities in the ancient world, ruling much of Europe, North Africa, and the Middle East. After the empire fell in 476 CE, Italy was ruled by different groups like the Byzantines, the Lombards, and the Holy Roman Empire.

During the Renaissance (around the 1300s to 1600s), Italy was home to amazing artists, scientists, and thinkers like Leonardo da Vinci and Galileo Galilei. But the country was still divided into many small kingdoms and citystates. Finally, in 1861, these parts united to form the modern country of Italy. Later, Italy became a republic in 1946, after World War II.

The Italian Economy

Italy has one of Europe's biggest economies. It is famous for making cars like Ferrari and Fiat, and for fashion brands such as Gucci and Prada. Many people work in factories that produce machines, clothes, and delicious foods like cheese, pasta, and olive oil. Farming is important too, especially growing grapes for wine and olives for oil. Tourism is a huge part of Italy's economy, as millions of visitors come each year to explore cities like Rome, Venice, and Florence. Italy also exports, or sells, these products to countries all over the world.




Attractions in Italy

Italy is divided into 20 regions, each with its own geography, traditions, and famous landmarks. In the north, the Alps form a natural border with countries like France and Switzerland, and regions like Lombardy and Piedmont are known for their mountains and lakes. Central regions like Tuscany and Lazio are rich in history—Florence was the heart of the Renaissance, and Rome was once the capital of the mighty Roman Empire. Southern regions like Campania and Sicily have ancient ruins, active volcanoes, and a warmer Mediterranean climate. Across the country, you can find famous landmarks like the Colosseum, the Leaning Tower of Pisa, the canals of Venice, and the ruins of Pompeii.

Natural Life in Italy

Italy has some of the most exciting natural features in Europe! It's home to several volcanoes, including Mount Etna in Sicily (one of the most active in the world), Mount Vesuvius near Naples (which buried the city of Pompeii in 79 AD), and Stromboli, a tiny island volcano that's often erupting. Italy's landscapes range from snowy mountains in the north to sunny coastlines in the south, which means many different animals live there. You might spot Italian wolves, brown bears in the Apennine mountains, wild boars, and even pink flamingos near coastal lagoons.



Festivals and Traditions in Italy

Italy is full of colourful festivals and fun traditions! One of the biggest is Carnevale, a celebration before Lent where people dress up in fancy costumes and wear masks, especially in the city of Venice. In Siena, there's a famous horse race called the Palio, held in the town square, with riders in medieval costumes. At Christmas. Italian families often wait until January 6th to exchange gifts, when La Befana, a kind old witch, brings treats to children. During Easter, many towns hold parades and events to celebrate. And let's not forget the food! Every region has special dishes they eat for holidays, like panettone (a sweet bread) at Christmas and colomba cake (shaped like a dove) at Easter!



Italian Culture and Cuisine

Italians love spending time with family, especially over long meals full of laughter and stories. Many famous artists, like Leonardo da Vinci and Michelangelo, were Italian, and their paintings and sculptures are still admired today.

When it comes to food, every region in Italy has its own tasty traditions. In Naples, pizza was born—thin crust with tomato sauce and cheese. In Bologna, people eat pasta like lasagna and tagliatelle al ragù (which many call Bolognese). Up north, you'll find risotto (a creamy rice dish), and in the south, people enjoy fresh seafood and olives. Italians often finish their meals with gelato, a creamy kind of ice cream that comes in all kinds of flavours!

Curiosities about Italy

- Italy has a volcano that's still active! Mount
 Vesuvius near Naples last erupted in 1944—and it's
 the same volcano that destroyed Pompeii on
 August 24, 79 CE.
- There's a fountain in Rome where people toss coins. The Trevi Fountain gets thousands of euros a day! Legend says if you throw a coin in, you'll return to Rome one day.
- The world's smallest country is inside Italy. It's called Vatican City, and it's where the Pope lives. It's only about half a square kilometre!
- Italians eat pasta in over 350 different shapes!
 From spaghetti to farfalle (which looks like a bow tie), each one is made for different kinds of sauces.
- Italy has more UNESCO World Heritage sites than any other country. That means it's full of important places the world wants to protect—like ancient ruins, old cities, and even beautiful countryside.



Sport in Italy

The most popular sport in Italy is football (soccer)—Italians are crazy about it!

Their national team, known as the Azzurri, has won the FIFA World Cup four times (in 1934, 1938, 1982, and 2006). Many Italian kids grow up cheering for famous clubs like Juventus, AC Milan, or Inter Milan.

But Italians also love other sports like cycling, especially the Giro d'Italia, a huge bike race that goes across the country.

In winter, people in the north enjoy skiing in the Alps, and some even practice fencing, a traditional Olympic sport Italy is very good at!
